
JAPANESE-STYLE PAINTINGS FROM THE COLLECTION

September 11 – November 3, 2015

A historically and culturally fruitful region Wakayama has brought prominent artists into the world in the field of Japanese-style painting. They cultivated the history of the modern art, and besides, artists from other area also visited Wakayama and made it their pictorial theme. In this exhibition, representative artworks from our collection are exhibited, that has been fostered around artists related to Wakayama. The two painters SHIMOMURA Kanzan (1862-1930) and KAWABATA Ryushi (1885-1966), who were both from Wakayama, played important roles in Tokyo after graduating from Tokyo Fine Arts School. The former engaged in the foundation of the Nihon-bijutsu-in (Japan Art Institute), and the latter joined in the Institute and then formed the art circle Seiryu-sha. Their works caused a stir in the conventional Japanese-paintings and now especially draw attention among our collection.

On the other hand, we have collected works from the school of Kyoto. NONAGASE Banka (1889-1964), who was from Nakahechi-town, Tanabe-city, Wakayama, learned in Kyoto Kaiga Senmon Gakko (Kyoto City Specialist School of Painting) and joined in the foundation of Kokuga Sosaku Kyokai (National Painting Creation Association). TSUCHIDA Bakusen (1887-1936) and MURAKAMI Kagaku (1888-1939) were members of the association, and HIDAKA Shokoku (1881-1961), who was also once involved in the association, and YAMAGUCHI Hachikushi (1890-1933), who worked in the Nihon Nanga-in association, have strong link to Wakayama. Works by them composes now a large part of our collection and tell the dramatically swinging situation in Kyoto at that time.

Furthermore, the bipolar styles from the cotemporary art collection indicate the possibility of the Japanese-style painting: the avant-garde expression by MIKAMI Makoto (1919-1972), SHIMOMURA Ryonosuke (1923-1998) and other members of the Pan-Real Art Association, which was founded after the war and got beyond the borders of the traditional Japanese-paintings, and the poetic expression rooted in the tradition by HIEDA Kazuho (1920-) who is still active in the front line.

In this exhibition, the fascination of the modern Japanese-style painting is highlighted with the artists related to Wakayama and the contemporaries, where tradition and innovation are across.
